

The Baird Auditorium is one of the oldest public performance venues and lecture halls at the Smithsonian. Named for the second Secretary of the Smithsonian Spencer Fullerton Baird and completed in 1909, the Baird Auditorium was designed and built under the direction of Rafael Guastavino and is among the finest U.S. examples of the Guastavino tile arch system.

The Baird Auditorium's events history is as diverse as the Smithsonian itself. Among the musicians who have graced its stage are: Muddy Waters, Mother Maybelle Carter, Pete Seeger, Sweet Honey in the Rock, Ernest Tubb, David Byrne, Wynton Marsalis, and dozens more. The Baird was the site of the 1920 'Shapley-Curtis Debate' on the size of the universe and the existence of outer galaxies, Alain Locke's 1933 landmark lecture on African American art, and the first public screening of motion pictures filmed underwater.
